Glendale Savings Aide Testifies in Washington

In testimony presented before the Senate subcommittee on housing last week, Charles A. Wellman, executive vice president, Glendale Federal Savings and Loan Association, commented about the pending legislation which would authorize the Federal National Mortgage Association to buy \$1,000,000,000 in FHA and GI home loans at par under a special assistance program.

"Certain provisions of the bill, which has passed the House, said Wellman, would violate the basic businesslike principles upon which FNMA originally was established, causing undue expense to the treasury."

Wellman's objection centered around certain provisions of the bill which did not clearly indicate how the buyer would receive benefits of low-cost housing.

While in Washington, Wellman also participated in a special presentation to President Eisenhower by members of the National League of Insured Savings Association, of which Wellman is chairman of the legislation committee. The delegation presented to Eisenhower a resolution that expressed the league's appreciation for his "personal leadership in the fight to maintain a sound dollar."

The showing is the last in the current series of the museum. Admission is free.

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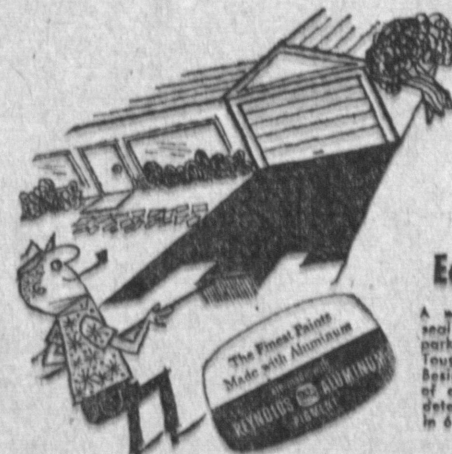
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
