

Juvenile Hall Will Be Built Here in 1962

Architects will begin plans for a \$4,000,000 South Bay Juvenile Hall next month, but the facility will not be built until 1962.

The detention home is to be built on a 2-acre site at Harbor Hospital.

Financing will be provided by a \$14,500,000 bond issue approved by voters in 1956.

A county spokesman said the delay in construction is due to a multimillion-dollar modernization program slated for the hospital.

Plans for a 600-bed acute unit and two-story outpatient clinic building able to process 9000 cases a month have been approved and bids will be opened June 15.

The improvement program will take about 730 days. It will be finished and the juvenile hall begun at the same time.

Torrance Plays Part in Largest Single Shipment

Torrance played a part in the largest single shipment of oil well drilling equipment from the United States to India.

The shipment, reported by the export division of The National Supply Co., includes two trailer-mounted drilling rigs, complete with 97-foot masts and power equipment, drill pipe, and 66,800 feet of steel casing.

National Supply manufactured most of the machinery and equipment in its plants at Torrance, and Gainsville, Texas.

Civilian employment rose to 5,790,000, a gain of 21,000 from February. Unemployment fell by 5000 to 361,000.

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Union Carbide Sales Up 9%

First-quarter sales of Union Carbide Corporation were 9% above sales for the first quarter a year ago and earnings were slightly higher than a year ago.

Morse G. Dial, chairman and chief executive officer, told stockholders at the annual meeting today. Sales for the first three months of 1960 amounted to \$395,301,000, compared with \$363,648,000 a year ago. Record net income for the first quarter of 1960 was \$42,091,000, or \$1.40 a share, compared with \$41,581,000, or \$1.38 a share, during the comparable quarter in 1959.

Dial pointed out that sales were the best for any first quarter in the Corporation's history. He also said that although net income did not maintain the same ratio of increase as sales, it still represented an all-time record for first-quarter earnings.

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
