The council voted with Drahe to have the area cleaned up and permit children to play on it without interference.

Council Holds Up Decision on Trailer Park

The City Council this week viewed the prospect of a new trailer park at 26311 Narbonne Ave. with mixed sentiments.

Mayor Isen stated his opposition to trailer parks in principle, declaring they do not carry what he called a fair share of taxes.

A representative of Lynn Chandler, the petitioner, reminded the council that no children will live in the park, so absence of school taxes would be no loss.

A motion by Councilman Nick Drahe to postpone action three weeks resulted in a 3-3 standoff. Another motion by Victor E. Benstead to deny the application met the same fate. Councilman Willys Blount was absent.

At suggestion of Isen, the motion to postpone action was reinstated and carried.

Consideration was not closed until Councilman George Bradford took the opportunity to call the operation shabby politics. He noted that a near-by ski run had been defeated by neighbors' opposition, but the residents were not unhappy about the ski resort until the trailer park was proposed.

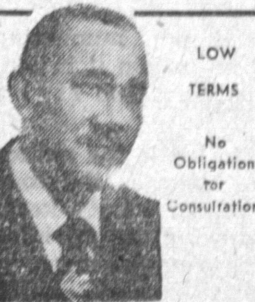
The ski run would have been built by the same petitioner.

High School, Eighth Grade Will Graduate

Some 900 high-school seniors will be graduated from Torrance's three high schools Thursday while about 1800 eighth-graders will leave their elementary schools in rites on Wednesday and Thursday.

The Torrance Adult School will award sheepskins to nearly 200 adults, ranging in age from 17 to 71, in rites on Monday, June 6 Superintendent J. H. Hull and Board President Walter Garra-brant will officiate.

Ceremonies at the three high schools will be held at 8 p.m. Thursday on their campuses. At North High, Grace Wright and Joseph G. Arnold,

school-board members will hand out some 350 diplomas, with personnel director Robert Morton.

South High's first graduating class, about 325, will get diplomas from William C. Boswell and Clinton Cooke,

board members, and Superintendent J. H. Hull. Torrance High's officials for 240 students will be Board President Garra-brant and Assistant Superintendent Albert Posner. Elementary diplomas will be handed out by the board members, past board members, school namesakes, and school administrators. Ex-board members Evelyn Carr and Dr. Howard Wood will

give out the diplomas at the schools named for them, while Industrialist Philip Magruder will do the honors at his namesake.
