## Parents, Children Study at Cooperative Nursery

Coast Cooperative Nursery School will soon close its fifth year of successful operation as a non profit, non sectarian parent cooperative. The school, sponsored by the Adult Education Division of Torrance Unified Schools, has its quarters at the Seaside Community Church, 22902 Ocean Ave.

Serving the South Bay community with a combined parent-education and nursery education schedule, the adult program is open to parents of pre-school children three years of age and over.

Parents study the latest child guidance techniques and hold semi-monthly meetings for group discussions.

They also hear lectures by experts in the fields of child study.

The management of the nursery is in the hands of

parent members. Mothers take offices, accept chairmanships, and serve on committees.

In addition they assist the certificated teacher one morning each week with the nursery program and attend a monthly workshop.

Fathers give three hours a month to the maintenance of equipment.

The school is in session Tuesdays through Fridays from 9 a.m. to 11:45 p.m. during the school year.

## Remedial Class in Reading Set in Waleria

Opening the center are the Kendale reading specialists, an association of state certificated teachers specializing in problems of reading.

This group is directed by Dale L. Boyce, a long-time resident, teacher, and advocate of the need for improving methods of teaching reading.

A graduate of USC with special work in remedial reading, testing and evaluation, Boyce said, "It has been our experience that most children will improve rapidly when proper diagnosis through testing, teaching to the specific needs of the child, and continuous evaluation techniques are consistently applied with motivation."

"Motivation is recognized as one of the most important factors in teaching reading," added Boyce, "this is especially so with the child who has experienced failure."
