Central Storage Highlights Plans of Hickory School

Innovations in school building will be incorporated into the Hickory Avenue Elementary School, under preliminary plans approved Tuesday night by the Torrance Board of Education.

Plans drawn by Neptune and Thomas, architects, show ten-sided classroom buildings. Each would have five Classrooms arranged around a central, teachers' work and storage area. Another feature would be sliding panels allowing adjustment of classroom size.

These proposals were made by a committee of principals and administrators who studfed ideas and construction plans from all parts of the country. They felt this arrangement would be more efficient, while costing no more than more conventional "finger-style" classrooms.


The Hickory facility will contain 10 classrooms, two kindergarten rooms, a multipurpose building, and an administration unit. Total cost is expected to be about \$450,-●000. It will serve a new subdivision located southwest of Sepulveda and Crenshaw.

The unusual arrangement of the classrooms is designed to permit more efficient use of storage and teachers' work equipment. Nearly every-thing needed for instruction-(Continued on Pase A-6)





dren do such things, maybe if we had more parks and equipment, the problem would cease," he said, adding that the new city plunge is a step in the right direction, Damage done by children engaged in such practices is very slight in this city, he mentioned, saying that when schools are broken into, sometimes money and equipment is taken, but buildings are never severely damaged. He made the comparision of vandalism in Los Angeles where desks were torn apart and basements flooded during the destruction process. 'This vandalism is not done as resentment towards schools, it is done as a game, with no revenge involved,'

he concluded. When the offenders are caught, a record is kept to enable officers to keep track of second-time vandalists.

"As a rule, the majority of offenders aren't repeaters, once caught, they learn their lesson," the chief commented. This type of offense is naturally hard to control, Bennett stated, but when officers begin investigation, it is usually quite successful.

Once caught, the parents are asked to make restitution for the destruction caused by their children.
