Mike Callas JACOBS RISKS LIFE AS UNDERWATER DIVER

Whenever relatives come visiting, mostly all of a sudden, its always a problem as to where to take them. Generally the "better half" comes up with suggestions only Conrad Hilton could afford.

Our household, already a noisey homestead with three young ones always making like Dennis the Menace, was invaded last week-end by blood brothers proclaiming their great admiration of us in the loudest tones possible.

After a hasty, but secret meeting with the spouse it was decided that we go to Marineland and watch the fishes perform. The Mrs. had no other choice. I had no extra loot but I was the proud possessor of a free pass to the water extravagenza.

While my free-loaders looked at the spacious oceanarium and marveled at the big and little fishes doing their tricks I wondered off and chatted with Jake Jacobs, Marineland's underwater diver. A middle-aged gentleman who carries cuts and bruises to remind him that sawfish and other creatures below the sea are not always choosey as to where their dinner comes from.

Won't Feed Self

Jake is not a big man. Under six foot by several inches he is nevertheless, a couregeous soul dedicated to his job. With a crew of four Jake's main duty at Marineland

is to feed the thousands of species of fish in captivity. Most difficult of this chore is the force-feeding of the 12 foot sawfish recently added to the oceanarium.

According to Jacobs the sawfish won't feed itself in captivity. At certain intervals Jake must stick his arm down to the sawfish's stomach with tasty morsels of squid. The sawfish, like most other fish, generally gets its food from underwater vegetation.

"It's not so tough," Jake told us. "After a while fish are like individuals. You can almost always guess what they are up to. They get used to you and before you know it they get to like you," Jacobs' says.

Writes Book

The oceanarium's chief diver for six years, Jacobs has ecently written a book of his experiences. It's appropriately titled, "Marineland Diver," and beautifully illustrated.


