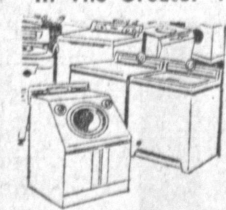

The four-day competition marks the first big league effort here to present professional bowling as a genuine spectator attraction.

A limited number of reserved seats and standing room tickets are still available at the box offices at Bowl-O-Drome for the co-sponsored Professional Bowlers' Association and Alex Schreiber and Family Enterprises 36-game competition today, tomorrow, Friday and Saturday.

Bowl Six Games
All entries are scheduled to bowl six games today on squads at noon, 3, 7 and 10 p.m.

The field will be cut to 96 bowlers for the 12-game semifinals at noon, 3, 7 and 10 p.m. on Friday, and the final 12 games on Saturday will be confined to 48 qualifiers on

squads at 2 and 8 p.m. The tournament is the final stop on the first coast-to-coast tour arranged by the PBA and the lineup of Bowl-O-Drome participants include the winners of five previous championships events at New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Nevada, and Northern California.

Money Winners
Also entered are nine of the 10 leading money winners on the gold trail. The individual leader is Tom Hennessey of St. Louis, the National Invitational champion at Las Vegas, Nevada, who has earned \$7050.

Second biggest winner is Don Carter, Hennessey's National doubles and Budweiser team partner, who has collected \$6050.

Among other likely favorites for the \$3000 Bowl-O-Drome first prize is slender Harry Smith of the St. Louis Falstaffs, the current National All-Star champion.

Principal challengers come from Missouri (13), Michigan (10), Illinois (7), Texas (7), Arizona (5), Washington (4), Pennsylvania (3), and one each from Oregon, Utah, Florida, New York, Kansas, Louisiana, and Minnesota.

California will be represented by a total of 96 bowlers, 67 from the southland and 29 from the bay area.

The local contingent is headed by Andy Marzich of Inglewood, Loy Countryman of Glendale, Carl Winfield of Hollywood, Jack Heydeman of Hollywood, and 19-year-old Ron Winger of Van Nuys, the members of the mythical Southern California 1959-60 season all-star team.
