Responsive, Responsible Citizenship for Survival, the theme of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, will set the pattern for the California Federation under leadership for the new president for the 1960-62 term of office, Mrs. Earl J. Hazelton.

Plans and dates for workshops, board meetings and conventions were announced at the annual summer conference of the state executive board just concluded in Fresno.

State board meetings are scheduled for Oct. 25 through 27 in San Francisco, and Jan. 31 through Feb. 2 in Los Angeles. The 1961 convention will be in Sacramento, May 8 through 11, with Sutter district in charge.

The board voted to reaffirm the following policies: opposition to paid television, to oppose the reapportionment of the senate, and to endorse and urge the division of beaches and parks to purchase the watershed area above the CPWC Redwood Grove in Bull Creek area, Humboldt County, and to recommend that such funds be appropriated.

In line with the General Federation program, the board adopted as the state international project for the next two years the CARE self-help community-development program for Latin America. Mrs. Gordon E. Smith will chairmen the international project committee.

Following the tour a spaghetti dinner will be served at 6 p.m. at Eippers Gardens, 25338 Pennsylvania Ave. Both events are open to the public.

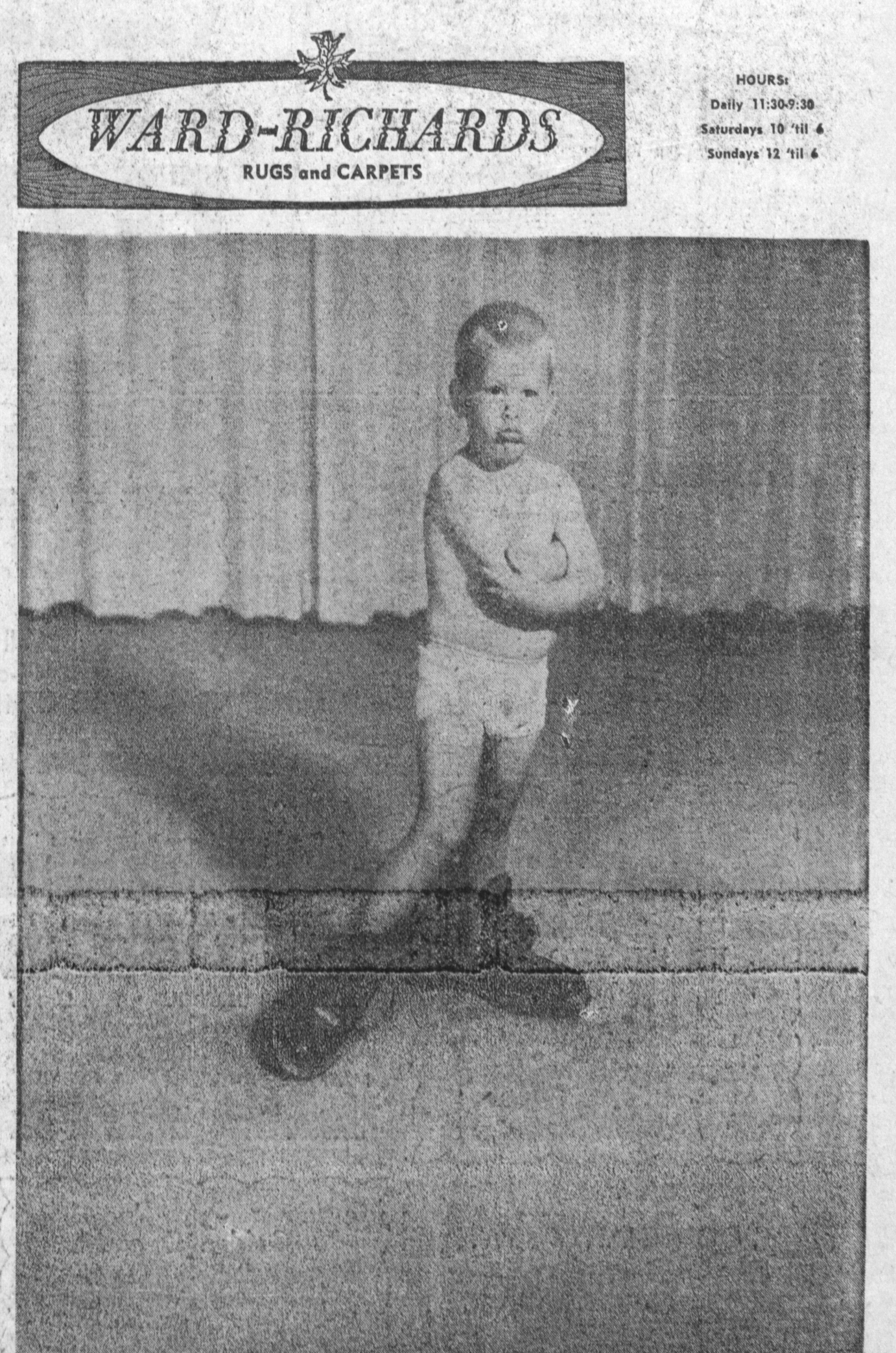
