Doctor Explains Forms of Cancer

The belief that many forms of cancer now considered beyond hope may someday prove curable was voiced recently by Dr. Sal Baker, President of the American Cancer Society's Los Angeles County Branch.

Dr. Baker said some research scientists believe that there is something within the human system — something still beyond their ability to comprehend or explain — which may hold the key to control of many presently hopeless cancers.

Two American Cancer Society investigators, Dr. T. C. Everson and Dr. Warren H. Cole, the latter currently serving as national president of the American Cancer Society, have collected data on 115 confirmed cases of spontaneous regression of cancer; according to Dr. Baker.

A spontaneous regression is an extremely rare disappearance of a cancer after it has attacked the patient, he explained.

"If research can identify the immunological or biochemical processes which lead to such regressions," he said, "it may at the same time uncover a new and useful weapon against the disease."

A number of other studies in the field of immunology also are being conducted under American Cancer Society auspices, Dr. Baker pointed out.

It is possible that these investigations may eventually show that cancer cells can be attacked by antibodies in the same way that disease-causing bacteria are attacked, he declared.

Closely related research on viruses also is aimed in this direction, according to Dr. Baker, who said the society is supporting virus research projects totaling approximately \$1,250,000 this year.
