State Committee **Recommends Laws** for Health Plans

New legislation was recommended Wednesday by a State Assembly subcommittee in an attempt to protect dance and health studio clients from the misrepresentation of a defunct Lomita health club.

The victims claim they were sold life memberships in the club which, immediateby after, went out of business. Despite the fact the club no longer exists, the clients' contracts are in the hands of a finance company which demands payment.

Some health club and dance studio practices verge "seriously close to fraud and extortion," the subcommittee reported. The group made we proposals to protect possible victims.

The committee proposed to forbid lifetime contracts. limit prepaid contracts to one year and prepayment to \$500, prohibit assignment of contracts to professional collection agencies, and require contracts to provide for termination on disability or

A suggestion from Attorney General Stanley Mosk to forbid contracts altogether and place all studios on a pay-as-you-go basis was turned down by the subcommit-
