

#### Highway Patrol Warns **Vacationing Motorists**

The California Highway Patrol suggests to vacationing motorists who are carrying camping equipment in their vehicles or are pulling heavy trailers to be sure their headlights are still in

alignment. "Extra weight in the back of station wagons, pickup trucks equipped with living quarters, and even family sedans can tilt the front end of the car enough to raise the headlights to an illegal position," CHP Commissioner Bradford M. Crittenden declared.

Crittenden noted that the vehicle code provides that automobile headlights must be strong enough to light the road so that a person or vehicle can be seen for a dis-tance of 100 feet when the low beam is used and 350 feet when the high beam is used. However, the lights must not blind an oncoming driver under any load condi-

"Headlights that are tilted upward because the rear of the vehicle has been lowered by extra weight can blind oncoming drivers and thus be illegal," he said.
