### School Board Seeks 50c Tax Override During October Election

budget is larger than the city's. Hull is not showing good faith in asking for this over-ride, and spends money foolishly," he charges.  
"The School Board, including North American administrator W. C. Boswell, president; Grace Wright, housewife; J. G. Arnold, Chicago

Bridge & Iron Co. executive; W. A. Garrabrant, retired contractor; and Clinton B. Cooke, National Supply superintendent, have been labeled a "rubber-stamp" by Planning Commission President Lynn.

"This is a straight out and out increase in taxes, without any time limit on the over-ride," Lynn maintains.

In accord with Lynn in this issue, Torrance Mayor Albert Isen declares he has not been informed of the school board's needs nor "has any attempt been made to limit the duration of this surcharge."

The school board received a tax over-ride of 75 cents in October, 1956, when 4032 citizens voted for it, Mayor Isen says. "There is no time limit marked for this second 50 cent over-ride and it is not designated for a certain period."

Aug. 4, the Torrance PTA Council, representing 32 units, will meet in the YWCA and be asked to endorse the tax over-ride. Meanwhile, Torrance taxpayers can decide on another tax bite, come October.

"The city however cannot lose any money," he added. Mayor Isen, in requesting a full report on this matter, refused to becloud the issue with tangent pros and cons. The issue here is whether the city is financing city councilmen, the mayor emphasized.

Jahn, meanwhile, appeared at the city council meeting Tuesday. He now represents the Southwest Rubbish Association, an organization of a number of companies, seeking to do business with the city.
