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Blind Adults Attend Camp

Applications from blind adults throughout California to attend Enchanted Hills Camp are being accepted by the Lighthouse for the Blind, 1097 Howard St., San Francisco, it was announced recently.

The adult session at the camp, located 12 miles from Napa, is divided into weekly sessions, beginning Sunday, July 31, and extending through Saturday, Sept. 3.

Enchanted Hills is believed to be the only resort in the West planned especially for the benefit of the blind person. Nearly two miles of plastic guide lines extend through the main camp area, enabling guests to travel independently from one activity to another.

Staff members are trained to introduce the visually handicapped to experiences in outdoor recreation ordinarily unavailable to them. Campers learn to swim, to fish, to row on the lake without fear. There are hikes through the woods, and the study of nature through sound and touch. Non-sectarian chapel services are held on Sundays in an outdoor cathedral of redwood trees. Evenings are given over to singing around the campfire, or to stunts and dancing in the ranch house.

Adult participants are asked to contribute \$3 a day toward their stay at Enchanted Hills. However, no blind person is refused admission because of inability to pay. There is no restriction as to race or creed. The camp is supported by private contributions to the non-profit lighthouse for the Blind.
