Here, she will be working with school systems, helping them to order materials and teaching them how to use these materials.

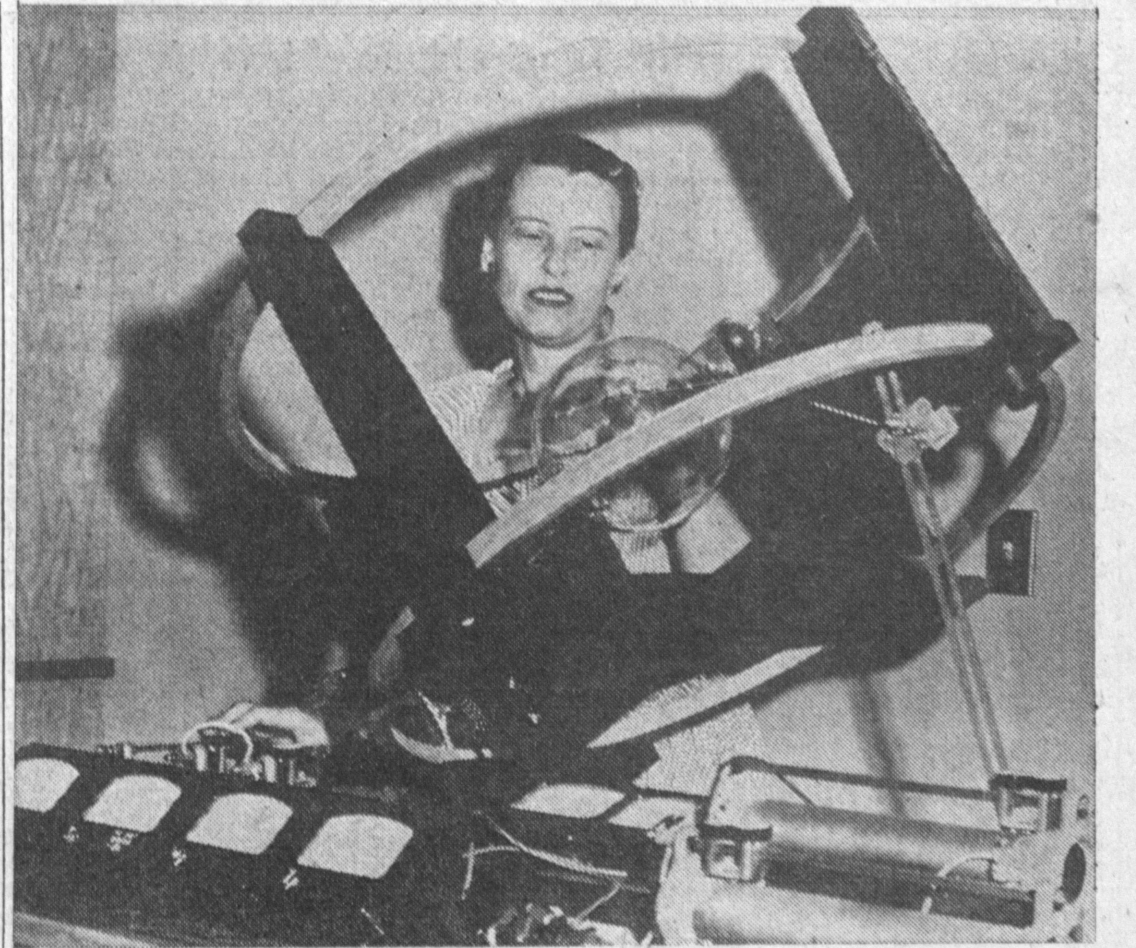
"I have always wanted to be a math major, Mrs. Lehman reminisced, "I knew for sure in junior high school that I would do just that," she added.

She added that the value and goal of physics courses is to show "how things act, how nature acts." Continuing, she added that she spends her spare time studying because, "no matter how much we know, there is still alot to learn, alot to study."

Enthusiastic about her weaving hobby, she said this past-time is a value to her because she can turn to it when having to wait for a ride or "when I have 15 minutes before starting dinner."

Through this hobby, she said, she has woven baby blankets, stoles, skirts, winter coat material, draperies and rugs. Her secret to success . . . "Be Busy."

Visiting the South Bay Area for the first time, a Youth Team from Cleland House of Neighborly Service of Los Angeles will present a program of guitar music, Mexican folk songs and dances for Rolling Hills Seahorses, Mariners of Saint Luke's Presbyterian Church of Rolling Hills Estates, tomorrow evening.

Anthony Hernandez, Director of Cleland House, will visit Saint Luke's with the team and will talk briefly on the history and work of the house.

Started in 1922 and sponsored by the United Presbyterian Church U.S.A., Cleland House serves the Eastside's predominately Mexican-American Belvedere area of 80,000 people, helping persons of minority groups to find happy, meaningful experiences to counteract existence in an over-crowded and underprivileged area.

Its program includes adults as well as youth. Among the many classes held each week are sewing, guitar, dancing, handicrafts, and sports.

During the summer months, 300 children attend camp through donated camperships. Other activities at the house include a mother's club, planned parenthood clinic, citizenship classes, thrift shop, toy loan library, Laubach literacy program, release time school, and Sunday school. Average attendance at recreational and educational activities is 7,000 per week.

"Meeting at 7:30 p.m. in the Butler Building on the church grounds, 26825 Rolling Hills Road, Saint Luke's Seahorses anticipate an evening of fun as well as inspiration.
