Sermon Locates Joy, Happiness

Ex-Entertainer Gives Message to Congregation

Guest speakers will be present at both the morning and evening services at the Torrance Foursquare Gospel Church, at Arlington and Sepulveda Blvd., Sunday.

At the 10:45 a.m. service, T. "Texas" Tyler, known as "the man with a million friends," one of the foremost country and western style artists for many years, will be featured at the services.

Until recently, "Texas" spent his time touring throughout the United States and Canada headlining "Grand Ole Opry" shows, appearing with his large dance bands in ballrooms, clubs, and on TV.

Tyler will tell the story of what made him change his life and become a preacher of the Gospel. He will also play his guitar and sing Gospel songs.

He was catapulted to nationwide fame in 1948 with his smash hit "Deck of Cards," which he wrote himself. He has the distinction of being one of the very few country and western artists to ever appear in concert at New York's famed Carnegie Hall. He has also been under contract to Columbia Studios in Hollywood in the making of western movies.

In his life story to be told Sunday morning, he will tell why, after 28 years in show business, he gave up the entertainment world turned his talents exclusively to Gospel work.

In the evening service, at 7:15 p.m., Dr. B. A. McKeown, member of the Board of the International Church of the Foursquare Gospel, who has recently completed a "round the world tour in the interest of missions, will be the guest speaker.
