around town that money is changing hands, that the old 'payola" game is being played in City Hall, that some city councilmen are padding their wallets over the garbage mess, then something is rotten in Denmark, Something stinks.

It is time for an all-out investigation. It is time to pull the cord and turn the white, hot light of publicity on the entire garbage collection business.

The garbage business, which brings in some \$350,-000 a year, and costs the city \$450,000 has been going on in the city since Torrance was first incorporated in 1921.

Now, to go on spending \$100,000 a year to collect and haul away rubbish is poor business, if a city can turn the matter over to a private reputable firm. We emphasize, "reputable."

Torrance got off to a wrong start by asking for bids in a sloppy manner, without agreeing upon specifications, without a complete understanding by the city council committee on what was needed.

A hodge-podge of bids were turned in, by firms offering one, three, and five year contracts, presenting a wide range of collection and disposal responsibilities.

Disatisfied, the Mayor threw the bids out, and turned the whole matter back to the city council committee to come up with absolutely accurate specifications, and a whole new look-see on the entire rubbish mess.

Aug. 29, the committee is scheduled to roll up its sleeves and get down to a work session.

The Torrance Press submits that ours is not the first Torrance Mourns city to face a rubbish mess. Other cities have had both private enterprise collecting and disposing of its rubbish, Drowned Victims and doing its own billing, as well as city-owned rubbish
