The Alondra Addition is bounded by Prairie Ave. on the west, Compton Blvd. on the north, Van Ness Ave. on the east, and Manhattan Beach Blvd. on the south.

A connecting strip running along the east side of Crenshaw Blvd. from Manhattan Beach Blvd. to Redondo Beach Blvd., the northerly boundary of Torrance, would have made the area contiguous to the present Torrance boundaries.

Voicing the entire opinion of the city council, Mayor Albert Isen declared "If the people in Alondra Addition do not want to annex to Torrance, that is their privilege. We are not trying imperiously to take in any territory."

Annexation to Torrance would mean extension of numerous civic services, fire, police and traffic, to the 4030 registered voters and property owners of the area.
