Built in the shelter will be provisions to measure inside and outside radiation levels and a pop-up radio antenna for use after a blast has occurred.

Designed with thick, reinforced concrete walls, covered with 30 inches of earth, the shelter will decrease the outside radiation levels by 1000 per cent.

This shelter is designed to provide protection from a 10 megaton, air-dropped, nuclear bomb at a distance of three and one half miles away.

"I am building this shelter because I feel an atomic war is more likely to occur if an aggressive nation has a definite advantage over others in regards to survival," Tuttle, father of three, Ronnie, Donnie, and Tommie, said.

"A good example of this," he added, "is the fact that the Russian government now has a large construction program in progress on community shelters."

AiResearch Plant Ready to Open in Torrance

air conditioning and pressurization systems for Project Mercury manned satellite, which will carry the first American in space.

On its 66-acre site in Torrance it hopes to consolidate some of these facilities and ultimately operate two units—the present one at Century and Sepulveda boulevards and the Torrance complex at 190th St. and Crenshaw.

Fundamentally, AiResearch was created to anticipate the needs of aviation problems encountered in high altitude flying. Along with pressurization, heat transfer equipment became the company's initial major development endeavor. One of its first products was an automatic oil cooler for aircraft.

Before moving to its present site at Sepulveda and Century boulevards, in 1941, AiResearch had production orders for Boeing B-17 intercoolers and Douglas A-20 coolers. It built these precision units in a small plant in Glendale.

After moving, provisions were made for laboratory facilities in high altitude research. Here, one of the chief problems in high altitude, high speed flight was solved. For protection and survival of pilots AiResearch developed the first pressurization system in the United States. This system was installed on the famed B-29.

Today's planes, like the new Boeing 707 jet transport, are fully equipped with AiResearch products which can maintain a comfortable 5000 foot altitude for passengers while the plane is flying at 30,000 to 40,000 feet.

Supervisor, Engineer Retire After 43 Years

Forrest J. Young, chief engineer, and Lloyd C. Warthan, supervisor of factory sales, have retired after 43 years service each at the Torrance plant of The National Supply Company.

Starting in 1917, when cable tool drilling was predominant and the deepest well was around 7,000 feet deep, the men have witnessed the change in preference to rotary drilling, with an increase in drilling depths to below 25,000 feet.

The Torrance plant, established in 1912 by the Union Tool Company, was acquired by National Supply in 1920.

Young's earliest experience was in the development of tools for cable tool drilling. Later, he contributed many of the designs and features

included in National's rotary drilling equipment. He has served as chief engineer since 1945, during which time National rigs drilled eight successive world's depth record wells, from 16,655 feet to 25,340 feet.

Warthan started as a clerk in the sales order department. He is regarded as having an encyclopedic memory of all plant products, including their part numbers, produced since 1917. After considerable field sales experience, he was appointed supervisor of factory sales in 1949.
