Bowling lessons are coming to a close this week Gable House.

The instructors have taught the fundamentals. Now it is up to the individual to put them to use. If you want to become a good bowler you must concentrate. Norman Belt told us today that timing is the most important single factor. When you perfect it, you can then concentrate on correct placement of your ball. We were told to get mad at those pins, don't baby them; get up there and be determined that you are going to strike, then do it.

In reading a booklet "The Complete Guide To Better Bowling" I learned the following facts: The biggest error that most bowlers make is that they lose their timing and do not follow through. Some bowlers cannot determine if they are bowling at the right speed. Generally you can tell by what pins you leave. Too much speed would leave the 4-pin. If the bowler would slow the ball down just a "fraction," the 2-pin would take care of the 4-pin. The same idea would pertain to the 10-pin. Slow up the ball and give the 6-pin time to knock the 10-pin down. Joe Norris states, "It is harder to tell if you are bowling too slow. The leave there won't tell you too much, but you probably will be able to notice the ball begins to get a little erratic. Your control is off and you're not hitting the pocket as much. That's why there is a perfect speed for every player-fast enough to hit the pocket with consistency, slow enough to dump all the pins.

I have been greatly impressed by the lessons given at Gable House these past weeks. I hope I can carry through what all of us have been taught. Gable House has booklets to read to help you in bowling. If you are serious about bowling or just want to have fun, come over anytime and
