(Continued from Page One) Peebles, Director of Public Works, explained. Specifications will establish routes, time of pickup, methods, as well as lesser items covering painting the pick-up trucks in suitable colors, washings, etc., Peebles declared. More than 10 bids were received last month, prior to the reevaluation by the Council. New changes in the specifications thrashed out by the Council will be printed and advertised throughout the county. It is the desire of the Council to complete examination of all bids and award a contract to begin on Jan. 1, he said.

City crews, meanwhile, under the direction of George Green, with whom the city has a month-to-month contract, are continuing to pick up and dispose of rubbish and combustibles. "Other cities have had many rubbish problems in past," the Mayor stated. "One of these neighboring cities, Alhambra, had to resort to the private collector's bond, because the collector was not rendering the service, and the city had to hire this work done elsewhere, with the bonding company making up the loss." In the meantime, rubbish and garbage stayed uncollected, with the attendant difficulties of strange operators unfamiliar with the routes. "Culver City is having its present problems, with a grand jury indictment just handed down," he added. Of 40 cities in Los Angeles county, recently surveyed, 11 have municipal collection, 13 use a private contractor, 7 use licensed contractors, and 8 have a combination of franchises and municipal pick-up.
