

School Workers Get Insurance

All members of Torrance School Employees, AFL-CIO Local 1101, will be covered with a group life insurance policy, and a dependents' clause is now being considered, A. R. Kendall, local president, announced today.

The insurance carries a re-employment and conversion clause and represents a "substantial savings," Kendall said.

New Subdivision Street Paving

Street improvements in a new subdivision in the Carson area were accepted by the Board of Supervisors for maintenance today.

The improvements include

pavement, curb and gutter, drainage structures and sidewalks to serve 59 homes at Berendo Ave. and 213th St.

These improvements were constructed under Road Department supervision by the developer at a cost of \$50,400. They will add 2,153 feet of streets to the system of maintained roads.

Another road system in a 52-home tract at 213th St. east of Normandie Ave. was accepted by the board today.

These improvements including the pavement, curb and gutter and sidewalk as well as drainage structures were built by the developer at a cost of \$55,300 and will add 1,457 feet of streets to the road network.
