## Carl Steele PTA Sets Polio Clinic

With paralytic polio cases increasing explosively throughout Los Angeles county, residents of this area were urged to protect all members of their families by obtaining Salk inoculations at regularly-scheduled \$1 clinics.

First, second, third and booster shots will be given from 6:30-8:30 p.m., Tuesday, Oct. 11, at the Carl Steele School, 19300 Inglewood Ave. Sponsoring the community-service event are members of the Carl Steele Parent-Teachers Association in cooperation with the March of Dimes.

Chairman of the project is Mrs. M. Jurco, who pointed out that due to the emergency, recommended interval between shots has been shortened to obtain maximum protection for unvaccinated persons. The first two shots may now be taken two weeks apart, with a third shot four weeks after the second. Fourth, or yearly booster shots should be obtained.

March of Dimes officials warned that all pre-school children are in the highest incidence category and should be fully immunized, as should all school children. Pregnant women are susceptible to attack and should be fully vaccinated.

With no shortage of vaccine and with the stepped-up program of area clinics, persons of all ages including those over 40 should obtain their full series of Salk inoculations, they added.
