Mrs. Smith will be awarded her certificate at the Southern California EPS Awards Luncheon, Oct. 29, at the Bel-Air Hotel in West Los Angeles, hosted by the Satellite Chapter.

Mrs. Smith is a charter member of South Bay chapter, having transferred from Queen Beach chapter in Long Beach. She first joined NSA (1) in 1943 as a member of the Gopher chapter, Minneapolis, Minnesota.

Presently employed as secretary to the Hearing Examiner for the Eleventh Coast Guard District, Long Beach, Mrs. Smith worked for the Coast Guard previously for ten years in the Merchant Marine Safety Division.

Mrs. Smith earned the CPS status by taking a twelve-hour, two-day test. Based on actual secretarial duties and responsibilities, the SPS ex-

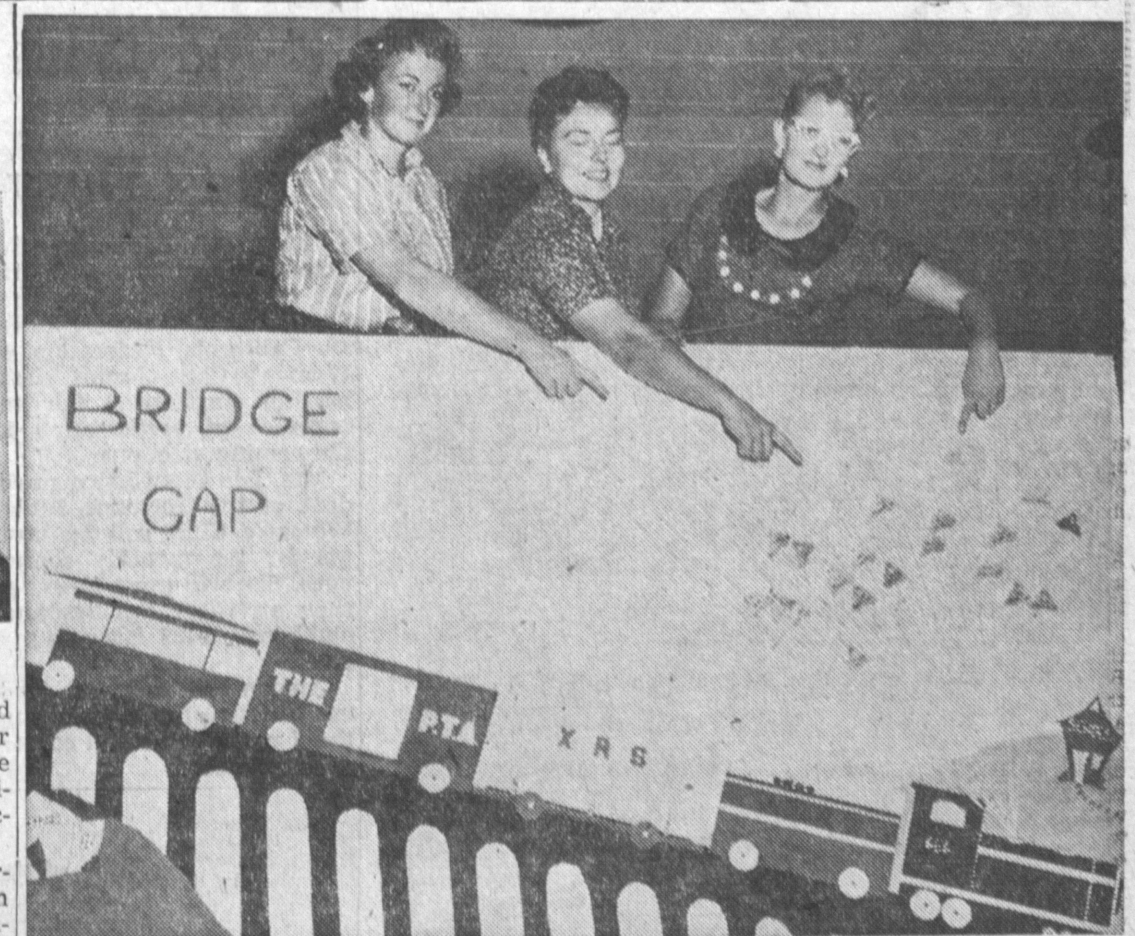

The six sections cover personal adjustment and human relations, business law, business administration, secretarial accounting, secretarial skills, and secretarial procedures. All six parts must be passed before the CPS rating is earned and the certificate issued to the candidate.
