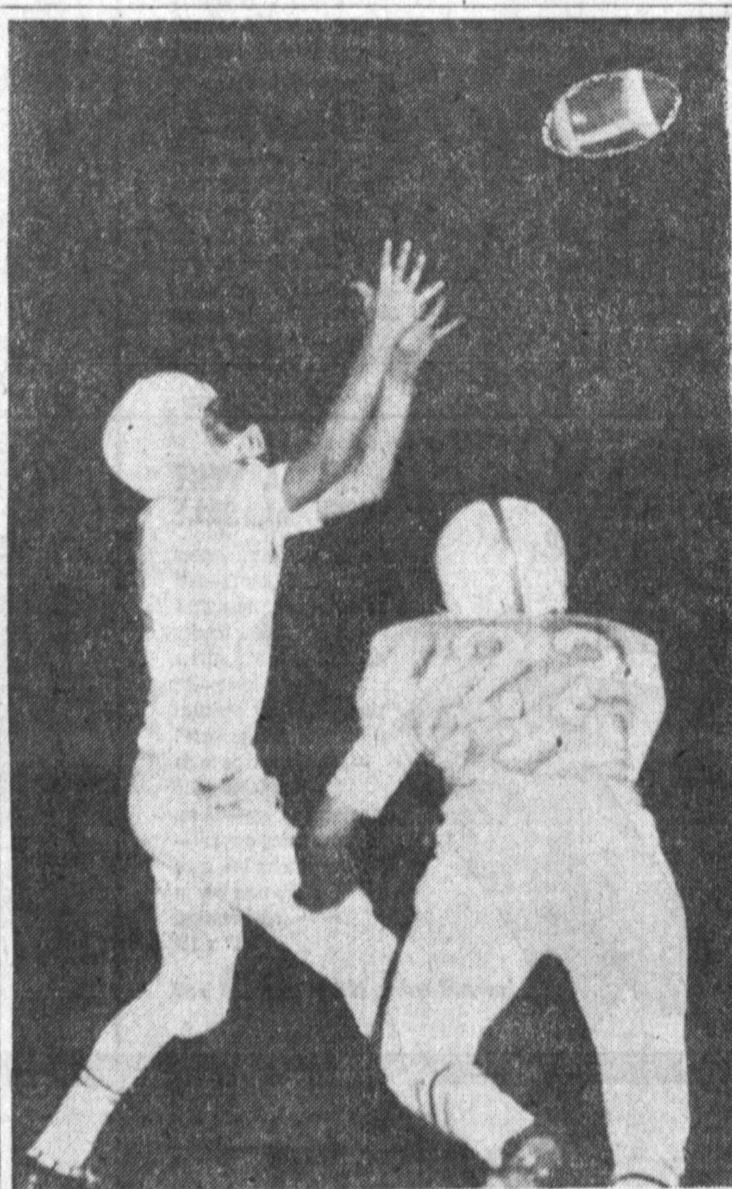
But that's not the main reason to hire Stengel. The 70-year-old manager brought a team into the world series that should have finished fourth in the standings.

SPARTANS, SAXONS THRILLER

With forty seconds to go in the game, Bob Wehrhan, South's sensational running back, was stopped on the one foot line by a stubborn Saxon eleven Friday night to wrap up the first Bay League encounter between the two Torrance schools in a 13-13 deadlock.

All the scoring for both prep organizations was done in the first half with South High taking the lead in the first quarter. Behind the pitching of Joe Austin, the running of Bob Wehrhan, and the receiving of Mike Andrews the Spartans put six on the scoreboard with Phil Fish carrying the final four, and a half yards to paydirt. Austin flipped to Andrews in the end zone for the extra point and with 5:51 remaining in the first quarter the Spartans led 7-0.

Shoup's gridders did not waste any time making their presence felt early either, for immediately after South kicked off the Saxons were on the way for their first tally. It took North nine plays to cross the Spartan goal line. Rick Jacobs, Bob Moore, Roy Dohner and Mike Cox went through for big gains with Jacobs plunging over from the two with just 1:39 left in the first quarter.

Defensive Units Hold Early in the second quarter a fumble by Joe Austin on his own 23 led the Saxons to their second score. Expertly thrown passes from Hubert to Pat Liningger and Felix Alivillar set the stage for Jacobs to bulldoze over from the one foot line.

After an exchange of punts, South took the pigskin on North's forty five yard marker and tallied in three plays. Austin's pass to Andrews was incomplete, Wehrhan flipped to Austin on the 35 for a first down, then the triple-threat star uncorked a long one to Phil Fish, who tucked it in on the eleven and raced the remaining yards for the six points. Austin could not quite make it for the extra point.

Because of fumbles, penalties and rough play during the second half, both squads were unable to cross pay dirt. It was apparent that Shoup and Tollefson had instructed their gridders to plug up holes in their defenses during half-time pep talks.

Late in the fourth quarter, with four minutes left, South started a drive, only to lose the ball on downs on the North one-foot line. With less than a minute to play, Carey Hubert was content to run short yardage plays through center to run the clock out.

Next week South hosts Morningside in a mid-afternoon game at Torrance High Stadium Friday and the Saxons journey to Leuzinger.

German Bowling Alleys Planned by Local Builder

Plans to enter the bowling field on a big-scale in West Germany with a network of luxurious establishments are announced by Harold Gelber, builder and former owner of The Plush Horse in Hollywood Riviera, who will launch construction on the multi-million-dollar project in January with huge recreational centers in Munich, Stuttgart and Dusseldorf.

Germany's first chain of deluxe glamour-styled bowling emporiums will be augmented a year later with the building of 12 more centers in Essen, Frankfurt, Bremen, Hamburg and Wiesbaden.

Cost of each of the 32-lane centers will be approximately one million dollars. The limited partnership of Harold Gelber and Associates is financed with California funds.
