

Slate November Construction for Bay Area Church

A consecration and groundbreaking ceremony was held Sunday, Oct. 30, on the site of the Redondo-Torrance Church of Religious Science at Prospect and Knob Hill. Three hundred members and friends heard Dr. Earl D. Barnum give the dedication address, after the presentation of the colors by the youth of the church, represented by John Robbins and Suzanne Hiatt.

Albert I. Lukes, vice president of the board of trustees, acted as master of ceremonies, and after reading a congratulatory telegram from Dr. Raymond Charles Barker of New York, stated that many such messages had been received.

Special guests introduced by Mr. Lukes included Rabbi Henri Front of Temple Menorah who spoke briefly on behalf of the South Bay Ministerial Association; Dr. and Mrs. Jesse Longe of Inglewood church; John Henry, manager of the Redondo branch of the Home Bank, and Mrs. Henry; E. J. Champion, local realtor; Howard Van Heuklyn, associate of Ritsley and Gould, architects, and Mrs. Van Heuklyn Charles W. Wallace of the C. W. Driver and Company, general contractors, and Mrs. Wallace.

Doyace L. Miller, building chairman, turned the first spadeful of earth, followed by Dr. Barnum, Leslie Fuller and Albert I. Lukes.

The benediction was pronounced by Dr. Barnum after those attending sang the Lord's Prayer, led by Arthur Hopkins and the church choir.

Construction of the first unit of the master plan will start early in November.

Navy Seeks Candidates for Officer Training

High school seniors and graduates have only until Nov. 18 to apply for the Navy's Reserve Officer Training Corps, Vice Admiral W. R. Smedberg III, chief of naval personnel, reported this week. Applicants will take the nationwide competitive examination Dec. 10 as the first step toward an appointment as midshipman.

Designed to supplement the officer output of the Naval Academy the NROTC program makes it possible for a young man to earn a regular commission while studying at a civilian college of his choice

which has an NROTC unit. All tuition, fees and books are furnished by the Navy, and the student receives an annual retainer of \$600 for four years. During the summers the student goes on interesting training cruises to many parts of the world. After completing the usual four year college course, he is commissioned in the regular Navy or Marine Corps and goes on active duty as a prospective career officer with the fleet.

High School seniors and graduates who have reached their 17th birthday by July 1 may apply for the aptitude

test. Those who make a qualifying score will be given a rigid physical exam early in 1961. From the number of qualified young men remaining in competition, at least 1600 will be selected to begin their naval careers next September.

The NROTC college training program is also open to enlisted men on active duty with the Navy and Marines.

Application forms are available at high schools, Navy recruiting stations or from the Chief of Naval Personnel, Department of the Navy, Washington 25, D.C.
