(Continued from page one) of polio, saw him win the governorship of New York and the presidency, and worked with him to steer the Democratic party in a progressive direction. Now that most of her uncle's Square Deal and her husband's New Deal are here and are almost taken for granted, Mrs. Roosevelt is often asked how she feels about the long struggle for reform. "Do you," she has been questioned, "feel that anything has been lost from the days when you were a child?"

SOMETHING LOST "Yes, something has been lost," she answered. "Wealthy people — upperclass people with a sense of social responsibility can't do the things they used to. And middleclass people have not yet learned to take over some of the old responsibilities. But most of the changes are for the better," she added. As a private citizen and voter, Mrs. Roosevelt concerns herself actively with her community. When she discovered she had missed, during the summer, a town meeting that defeated the school budget, she was quite disturbed and went to work to inform herself and all aspects of the local controversy.

MARTHA WASHINGTON Martha Washington was often called "Lady Washington," reports World Book Encyclopedia. She was one of the richest women in Virginia and presided over the Executive Mansion with great dignity and grace.

Model Congress Names Republican as 'President'

Although John Kennedy is recognized to be the winner in the national elections, the "president of the United States" at Torrance's Rivera Elementary School will be Jack Salzer, a Republican. The youngster was chosen at a special school ballot held Tuesday.

Occasion was the selection of the office holder in the annual eighth grade model Congress sessions at Riviera School. There, students go through the same motions that their parents follow in choosing president, congressmen, and other officers. As part of their social studies work, these elected officers will imitate their elders.

'NATIONAL CONVENTION' Youngsters held national conventions of both "Republicans" and "Democrats," compete with nominating speeches, platforms, banners, and other familiar procedures.

In the conventions, Terry O'Halloran and Bob Fluke were named as "Democratic" candidates for president and vice president respectively, while "Republican" standard bearers were Salzer and Joanne Cordes.

As a continuing social studies project, the students will hold sessions of the model government, actually doing research on and discussing the same issues which will face the newly-elected and appointed officials in Washington, D.C.

Annual Model Congress was started at Riviera School several years ago by Mrs. Irma Wilson, who now teaches at South High School, Torrance. Last year, she was presented with a Freedoms Foundation Award for her work in helping to promote Americanism in connection with the model congresses.

Every one of the 89 students will have an office of some kind as the model government continues. Holding major offices will be House Speaker Cathy Pollard, Senate President David Patterson, Majority Leader Tim Kuehnel, Minority Leader Ross Gardner, Chief Justice Ron Chan, and Secretary of State Lynn Babcock.

Christmas Seal Drive to Begin Monday in County

A total of 1,250,000 letters containing Christmas seals and educational material on tuberculosis will be released through the mail this week-end by the Tuberculosis and Health Association of Los Angeles County. Official opening of the 54th annual campaign is Monday, Nov. 14.

Dr. Arnold O. Beckman, president of Beckman Instruments, Inc., and 1960 honorary Christmas seal chairman for the county, said that the local campaign is being sponsored in conjunction with the National Tuberculosis Association and some 2700 state and local TB and health associations throughout the country. He added that the Christmas Seal campaign is the sole source of support for the independent voluntary health agency.

SUPPORT FIGHT "To support the year-round fight against tuberculosis and other chronic respiratory illnesses, the TB and Health Association of Los Angeles County has established a goal of \$850,000," Dr. Beckman said. "Year-round programs of the organization include TB and health education, case detection, rehabilitation and research, as well as beginning programs in areas of other chronic respiratory illnesses and research into the health effects of air pollution."

"The voluntary participation by every family in our community will assure continued awareness of TB, which in 1960 has claimed more than 2000 new victims in the county. An all out effort by the TB and health association is now aimed at eliminating TB as a public health menace here by 1970." Dr. Beckman said that the official "kick-off event" of this year's campaign will be held Monday, November 14 at 10:30 a.m. in Pershing Square.

Harbor Volunteers to Attend Nov. 16 Chest Report Meet

Community Chest volunteers will meet Wednesday noon, November 16th at the Plush Horse Inn, 1700 South Pacific Coast Highway for the annual Harbor area lunch and report meeting. City chairmen will report the progress of the campaign in the cities of Gardena, Torrance, Rolling Hills, Palos Verdes, Lomita, San Pedro and Wilmington.

"I urge all volunteers to try to meet their individual quotas in time for this meeting," said Harbor area chairman Jim Becker. "People cannot be expected to give the United Way unless they are asked to give."

VOLUNTEERS PRESENT "I hope as many of our 5,352 Harbor area volunteers will be present at this meeting as are able," Becker said.

Some 27 percent or \$32,326 of the total \$119,500 Harbor area goal had been collected by last Thursday, November 10th. The city totals at that time were, Gardena \$8,786, Torrance \$8,270, Rolling Hills \$332, Palos Verdes \$530, Lomita 305, San Pedro \$7,113, and Wilmington 6,690.

The 1960 United Way appeal is asking for \$12,000,000 throughout the Greater Los Angeles area. Over 80% of the funds collected will go to help children through such Chest supported agencies as, Children's Hospital, Boy Scouts, YWCA and CYO. The PTA's Child Dental Program, Child Guidance Clinic, and School Health Program also receive United Way funds.

Island Police Chief Visits El Camino on World-Wide Tour

Col. Telesforo Tenorio, chief of the Manila Police Department in the Philippine Islands, interrupted an international tour during the past week to visit the campus of El Camino College and visit classes instructed by a former colleague, Joseph Gadden.

Internationally recognized as a police authority, Tenorio has been called upon to address scores of international police conferences throughout the world during the past 10 years. In Manila, he heads a small army of police officers totaling 2,334 men.

In his work in the Philippines, the police enforcement officer is assisted by 32 police captains and is also responsible for 1300 prisoners and 150 guards in the local correctional institution. During the days of World War II, Tenorio, then a police officer on the Manila Police Department, and Gadden, an intelligence officer with the United States Coast Guard became fast friends.

Gadden, who is an art instructor on the college campus, established a career in education following retirement from the intelligence service.

Describing higher education in his own country, the campus visitor told art students enrolled in Gadden's classes that Santa Tomas University in Manila was founded in 1620, the year in which the Pilgrims came to North America.

County Assessed Over \$11 Billion

The State of California's total net assessed valuation for the 1960-61 fiscal year is \$29,600,924,411.

This was disclosed in the annual report on the counties' assessed valuation and tax rates issued by the office of State Controller Alan Cranston.

The total, Cranston said, is 7.87 per cent higher than that of a year ago.

Los Angeles County passed the \$11 billion level, its net assessed valuation for 1960-61 amounted to \$11,688,344,335.

Narbonne Ranch Water Contract to Low Bidder

Contract for the reconstruction of a portion of the distribution system of the former Narbonne Ranch Water Company No. 2 was awarded by the County Board of Supervisors to the Edward R. Siple Company of 2545 San Fernando Road, Los Angeles.

According to Supervisor Burton W. Chace, the firm offered to do the work for \$99,000 which, he said, is \$35,100 under the County Engineer's estimate of the cost of the improvement.

Eight bids had been received ranging from \$99,900 to \$139,899.

According to the Supervisor, County Waterworks District No. 13 acquired the former Narbonne Ranch Water Company after the service area was annexed to District No. 13 and bonds were authorized for acquiring and reconstructing the obsolete system.

Work under this initial contract consists of installing approximately 12,200 lineal feet of 6.8, and 10-inch diameter water mains, fire hydrants and appurtenances in an area bounded by Lomita Boulevard on the north, Oak Street on the east, 248th Street on the south, and Pennsylvania on the west.

Upon completion of the work in about 90 days, all customers in this area will receive water at a pressure of 60 to 70 pounds per square inch from County Waterworks District No. 13.
