Chinese Scholar Slated to Address AAU Women

"Communist China after 11 Year" will be the subject of a talk by Dr. Richard F. S. Yang, distinguished Chinese scholar of the faculty of USC when he is presented by Mrs. Hugh Hixon, chairman of the international relations study group of the Palos Verdes-Rolling Hills branch of the American Association of University Women, at their general meeting, Nov. 17, 7:30 p.m. in the Palos Verdes Library.

Dr. Yang, a recognized authority on Chinese affairs, was called to USC this year to take charge of the intensive Chinese language program sponsored by the federal government under the National Defense Education Act.

Born in Peiping, Dr. Yang graduated from Yenching University in 1943 in the first class to be graduated from that famous Christian institution at its wartime campus at Chengtu in western China.

The permanent campus at Peiping had been closed by the Japanese soon after Pearl Harbor, and Dr. Yang was one of 150 students who made their way through the Japanese lines to the temporary campus at Chengtu 2,000 miles away.

During World War II, Dr. Yang was active as a newspaper reporter in the China-Burma-India theater. After the war he returned to Peiping to serve his people as chief of the Chinese section of the relief work sponsored jointly by the Chinese government and the United Nations.

Since his arrival in the United States in 1947 he has served as a teaching assistant at the University of Washington in Seattle while earning his M.A. degree in international relations and his Ph.D. in Far Eastern studies. Since 1955 he has been Assistant Professor in the Chinese Department of the university.

The coffee hour preceding the meeting on Thursday evening will be directed by Mrs. Richard M. Linde, assisted by the members of the International Relations Study Group committee.

HJC Students Attend State Conference

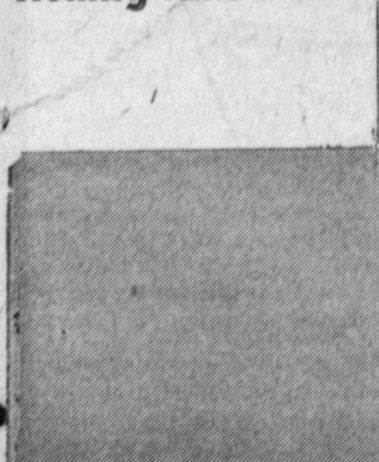
