Torrance High gained a piece of the Pioneer League title Friday night by defeating Lennox 21-7 at Tartar Stadium before an excited home town throng of 4500.

Coach Irv Kasten's Tartars are now knotted for first place honors with Culver City and Aviation. Monday league representatives will meet to decide who will meet St. Francis, the Paroical League winner next Friday. Because the Tartars lost to Culver City during league action, it is expected that officials will decide between Culver and Aviation as to who will represent the Pioneer League.

Torrance scored the first time they had their hands on the ball driving 67 yards in 10 plays with Jerry Mclean going over from the one yard line. Mike Tracy booted the extra point and the Tartars led 7-0.
