### Tax Pressure Relief Sought for Owners

Torrance City Council Tuesday evening sounded the death knell to the controversial Weed Abatement program of the city.

In its second session dealing with the problem Councilmen heard more upset citizens complaining of "outrageous" tax bills for the service, contracted by private concerns but collected by the county on its tax rolls.

William R. Kulpaca, 4300 Emerald St., Torrance, told the councilmen that he had been billed \$4075.60 for the removal of 400 truckloads of dirt from his property. He said that, at the most, the agency couldn't have removed more than 40 truckloads, that 400 truckloads would have leveled the surface of his five-acre property by 15 feet' Councilman J. A. Beas-

ley, who favored continuing the, weed abatement program, but on a modified level, said, "This program, which was a good idea to begin with, has developed into a general cleanup program · operating on the whim of a few individuals." He recommended that the

program be modified and put under the direct control of the fire department. A spot vote of the council, called by Mayor Albert Isen, rejected the plan, 4-2.

A second motion, proposed by Mayor Isen, calling for a one year moratorium on action of the district, was approved. Few doubts remained with councilmen that, the program

would ever be revived. Mayor Isen said that the program had originally been a good idea to get rid of weeds, sumps and scrap concrete, but that the idea had gotten out of hand.

An immediate study is planned by the City Manager's office to determine what relief measures may be obtained from the heavy tax burdens handed to local landowners, many of whose tax bil's had been increased by three and four times normal by the high charge for the cleanups.
