ALL-AMERICAN CITY TEAM NOW PRESS FIXTURE IN CITY

In 1959 after the conclusion of the scholastic football season, with the aid of almost 3,000 ballots cast by students, faculty, and fans, the sports staff of this newspaper chose eleven gridgers from the rosters of North, South, and Torrance High, to a mythical All-American City football squad. It was the first such attempt, in this city, to give the participating gridgers an opportunity to vie for a berth on this powerful eleven.

Each winning player was awarded with a trophy symbolic of his gridiron achievement. This writer chatted with each player selected and all agreed unanimously that the event should be continued—that healthy competition was created among the schools, that they considered this honor equal to being voted on the All-Pioneer or Bay League squads. A similar poll of coaches, athletic advisors, and educators felt the same way.

As a result of this overwhelming enthusiasm, the staff and publisher of the Torrance Press decided to continue the yearly quest for an All-American city football team. In the past two weeks, since voting began on the selections for 1960, it may be stated that ballots are pouring into the offices of the Press with the rapidity of those cast in 1959.

Needed in City

In a city as large as Torrance, where neighbors have had but a few years to get acquainted, the newspaper of the city is the media for bringing all sections of the metropolis together. It is the process whereby Mrs. Jones knows what's happening in Central, North, or South Torrance. It, the publication, is the chronicle of all that has happened, just happened, and about to happen. El Camino Distance Runners Fourth In All-SoCal Meet at Pierce JC

El Camino College runners captured fourth place in the All Southern California junior college cross country meet Tuesday, as Cerritos won the team title with a low score of 70, on the Pierce College course.

Bob McCalla of Fullerton College won the race in record time, covering the two and nine-tenths mile course in 14 minutes and 38 seconds. The old record, 15:40, was Pierce.

Fullerton finished runner-up to Cerritos with 79 points, while Orange Coast was third with 82 and El Camino fourth with 136.

Star El Camino barrier Rich Fernandez captured 10th position in the time of 15 minutes, 12 seconds. Teammates Dennis Hansen, 15th; Ron Bolton, 21st; Chuck Ehlers, 38th and Dick Redfield, 42nd, followed Fernandez.

Twenty-five junior colleges and 200 runners participated in the annual meet.

GARDENERS' CHECKLIST

Prepare ground for planting bare-root roses when they arrive on the market in a fortnight or so. Work manure and bonemeal into the soil. A little extra work now means better trees later.

If crab grass bothered you last summer (if you had it, it bothered you), check with your nurseryman about a control to apply now.

Layer manure in shrub bed

and let the rains work it in.

Work bonemeal and commercial soil conditioners into the soil also.

Winter stocks need good drainage. Be sure you don't

plant them in a garden low spot.

Feeding a lawn in late November does a lot toward keeping it green over the winter.

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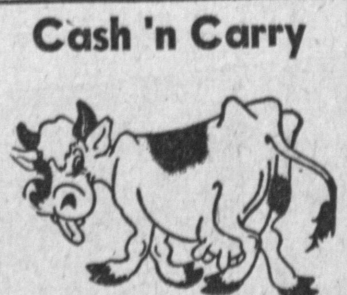


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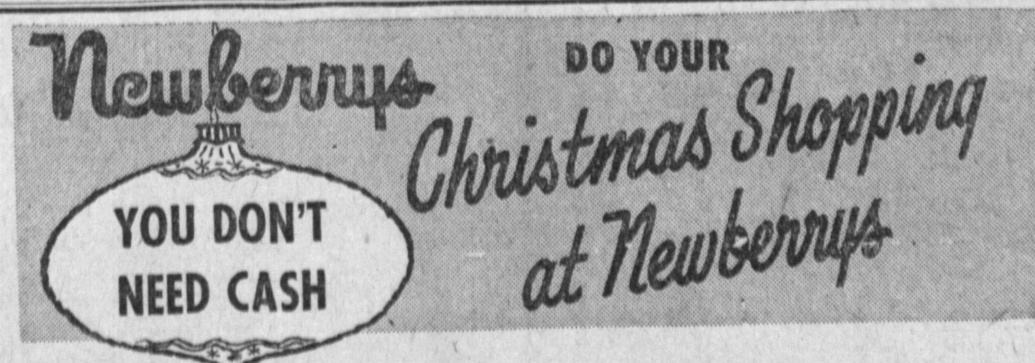


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
