While on alert, the company must remain in its area with combat packed and vehicles loaded in anticipation of immediate departure.

try's Company B at the fort, entered the Army in February 1959 and completed basic training at Fort Ord, Calif.

## Forty-Two States Represented by BPA All-Stars

A record 42 states will be represented among the 338 bowlers who will make up the field for the 20th annual BPAA All-Star bowling tournament, it was announced this week by the tournament department of the Bowling Proprietors' Association of America, sponsoring organization for the All-Star show.

The record equalling field—240 men and 98 women—will be shooting for a record \$68,150 in prize money during the ten-day tournament from Jan. 12 to 21, in the National Orange Show Exhibit Hall in San Bernardino, Calif.

The bowlers, all of whom qualified through local or state BPA Match Game eliminations or were seeded for past performances in BPAA events, will be shooting for a \$10,000 first prize in the men's division and \$5,000 in the women's division. The record prize money was increased \$8,150 above last year by the BPAA Tournament Committee.

Taking the lanes in defense of their titles will be Harry Smith of St. Louis and Sylvia Wene of Philadelphia. Last January in Omaha, Smith copped his first BPAA All-Star title by edging Bob Chase of Kansas City. Miss Wene captured the women's trophy and \$5,000, rolling the first 300 game in All-Star history by a woman en route to the title. She beat out seven-time winner Marion Ladewig of Grand Rapids, Mich., by less than one point.

**Lomita-San Pedro Council** PTA session had as guest speaker, H. Lee Hanson of the school defense activities board of education.

Teaching children the art of self-preservation is the aim of the L.A. City Schools Disaster Activities. Monthly and periodic fire drills, drop drills, alert and take-cover drills teach the child to think for himself and how to care for himself in times of emergency, stated Hanson.

Hanson, who has been in the area for many years, was teaching at Banning High School during the early 1930's earthquake. He has witnessed the Bikini A-bomb tests and other disasters which gave him first hand knowledge of the consequences of being unprepared, and the best methods of protection.

Making a five-week tour of Russia last summer, Hanson stated that Russia is preparing itself for any disaster which may befall that country. During this tour, he visited schools, defense plants, and one of the largest underground shelters in the world. This shelter is 220 feet underground, has airconditioning, housing and sanitary facilities, feeding facilities, and everything necessary for the care of the population.
