A warm, dry shelter and clean drinking water should be available at all times, even when the pet's owners are absent for just a brief spell Of course, special arrangements should be made for the animal's care should it be necessary for overnight visits or longer.

1/4 teaspoon nutmeg, option-

4 teaspoons rum flavoring.

optional heavy cream, cup

whipped

Combine gelatine and sugar in top of double boiler. Stir in cup of the cold eggnog. Place over boiling water and stir until gelatine and sugar are dissolved. Remove from heat; add remaining eggnog. If additional flovoring is desired, add nutmeg and flavoring. Chill until mixture mounds slightly when dropped from a spoon. Fold in whipped cream.

Turn into a 6-cup mold with fruit design; chill until firm. Unmold. Put few drops desired food coloring in small cups; mix will small amount water. Use small paint brush to outline fruit on mold. Return the gelatine dessert on its serving platter to the refrigerator and keep chilled until dessert time. Yield: 10 servings.
