"Smash and Gråb" bandits have victimized two jewelry stores, smashing the show window glass and grabbing merchandise displayed there. Occurances took place less than a week, and less than a block, apart! Owner of a large furniture shop, who had discovered

a burglary only on hour before this editorial was written, said, "I wonder where our police are? I can see them at any time drinking coffee in some shop but when our police blotters are full of unsolved burglaries of homes and business establishments I began to wonder." Individual businessmen feel that patrolmen, on their

own, are turning in outstanding records but that in the patrolling of commercial firms something is lacking. Majority of the merchants seemed to feel that the lack was on the administrative level.
