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

**Cleared In Minutes** Within five minutes following the call the bank had been cleared and the search begun.

Post stated, "We felt from the beginning that the call was a prank, but we couldn't possibly affort to take a chance.'

Normal operations at the bank had been resumed by 2:30 p.m.

Because of recent bomb scares involving 'aircraft and public buildings, federlegislation has been al passed involving very stringent penalties for anyone found guilty of perpetrating such a hoax.

**Annexation Fight** Lomita Property Owners and Registered Voters, Inc. under the direction of their president, Dessie G. Myers, have been working to have the annexation laws changed to make it harder for cities which are adjacent to Lomita to annex territory without

the consent of the people. LPORV's have written letters to Assemblyman Vince Thomas, Senator Richard Richards, and Assemblyman Bradley, chairman of the Interim committee on Municipal and County government asking for better laws.

"We are protesting the proposals of Governor Brown's Commission on Planning and Zoning which allows cities to annex without regard to the wishes of the people," said Dessie Myers.

"We feel this is a violation of our rights and if our franchise is taken away in one instance, it will be soon taken away in another," the president continued.
