

Second Dental Question, Answer Series Today

(This is the second in a series of questions and answers on dental health published by Torrance Press, in cooperation with the Harbor District Dental Society, in observance of National Children's Dentl Health Week February 5 through 11.)

WHEN SHOULD MY CHILD BE TAKEN TO THE DENTIST FOR THE FIRST TIME?

As soon as he has all of his primary teeth, between the ages of 21/2 and 3. On this first visit the child has a chance to become acquainted with the dentist, his office and his equipment. Usually the dentist will clean and x-ray the child's teeth. Since half of all 2-year-olds have one or more decayed teeth, it . may also be necessary for the dentist to restore a tooth. The dentst will suggest how often the child should return for subsequent check-ups.

WHY SHOULD MY CHILD'S BABY TEETH BE TAKEN CARE OF? HE'LL LOSE THEM ANYHOW.

One reason is that a child's first teeth are not really "baby" teeth, since some of them remain in his mouth until he is 11 or 12 years old.


