

Supervisor Demands Immediate Study of Cost to Taxpayers in Narcotics Cases

Supervisor Kenneth Hahn this week issued a strong statement supporting a request for a study to compute the heavy cost to Los Angeles County taxpayers because of narcotics.

In his opening statement, Hahn said, "As the members of the Board know, we are receiving strong support in behalf of our narcotics legislative program, AB 205 by Assemblyman Charles Chapel.

State Allocates **Funds for Local Street Repairs**

The California Highway Commission this week allocated funds for several proj-

Los Angeles County, \$750,-000 was allocated for widening from four lanes to six on Hawthorne Boulevard between U. S. 101 Alternate in Torrance and Manhattan Beach Boulevard in Lawndale, a distance of 5.7 miles. The widening will connect with the existing six-lane section north of Manhattan

Beach Boulevard. An additional \$587,000 to be added in varying amounts to the allocations for seven previously budgeted projects for median barriers on various freeways. The projects are on the Hollywood, San Bernardino, San Diego, Golden State, Harbor and Santa Ana Freeways. Since these projects were budgeted, it has ben decided to add sign revisions and other miscellaneous work to the jobs. The allocation increases the total amount available for these projects from \$1,706,000 to \$2,293,000.

COOPERATION

"I would move that the chief administrative officer, the sheriff and the district attorney cooperate in furnishing to the Board of Supervisors, as soon as the same can reasonably be prepared, an estimate as to the Torrance Heart direct cost to County taxpayers in the investigation arrests, arraignment, prosecution and incarceration of narcotics addicts and peddlers covered in our County budget.

"Also an effort should be made to compute indirect costs that are reasonably related to the narcotics traffic being paid for by

taxpayers in our Country. INCLUDE COSTS

Hahn said that what he had in mind is that the number of deputies assigned to the Sheriff's narcotics détail be included, the number of district attorney's office subordinates assigned to the prosecution of narcotics cases, tranportation and other expense in the investigation and arrest of narcotics users and peddlers and some idea of the court costs involved. "Many law enforcement

officers have stated," Hahn concluded, "that 50 percent of the major crimes committed in Los Angeles County are directly or indirectly attributed to the narcotics traffic. If these statements are true, every taxpayer, especially the small home owner, should be vigorously supporting the County's position to have the Legislature and the Governor enact strong narcotics laws not only to protect the youth of our community, but to reduce propperty taxes.'
