

### Lomita Barbershop. Involved In Dispute, Gutted By Fire: Estimate \$5000 Damge.

A resumption of unionmanagement warfare in the South Bay area was feared today following the gutting of a Lomita barbershop in an obviously set fire early Monday morning.

Damage was estimated at between \$3,000 and \$5,000. Owner Ellis Albertson had drawn attention to the dispute earlier this month when he hired professional models to pace pickets in front of his shop carrying placards proclaiming his empleyees were not on

Deputies of the Sheriff's arson detail reported that was siphoned directly into

Deputies were not sure whether the gasoline was ignited by a hot water heater located in the rear of the shop or whether a match was thrown through the

Investigators said that the burning of the shop followed exactly the same pattern as the blowing up of barbershops in Norwalk and La Puente, and the attempted burning of a shop in Covina. Each of the shops was non-union and was being picketed at the time of the attempts.
