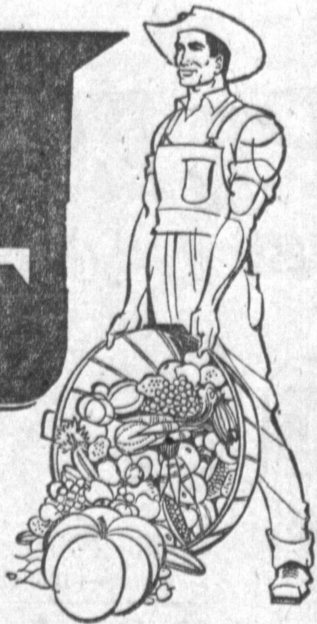

Local Youngsters Get Kite Flying Instruction Book

G. L. Blanchard, Southern California Edison Company's district manager announced that nearly a half million copies of "Huckleberry Hound's Kite Fun Book" will be given to youngsters in schools and communities served by the electric power company.

The expression "Go fly a kite" isn't an insult this time of the year—it's an invitation to lots of fun.

Like any other outdoor sport, it can best be enjoyed when played according to the rules or so TV star Huckleberry Hound tells children in the free booklet.

Speaking from the entertaining pages of a comic book, Huck tells his fans the basic rules for safe kite flying, including the good advice that no metal, wire, tinsel or metallic twine be used in the kite's frame, tail or string.

FLYING RULES

He also points out that these should be flown in open fields, well away from telephone and power lines, television antennas and roads or highways. In addition, Huck suggests that kites not be flown when it is raining because "if it gets wet, even plain string is a good conductor of electricity."

If a kite flies by chance catch a wire or snag a utility pole, the kite flyer should let go of the string immediately. He definitely should not try to pull the kite free or climb the pole, the book points out. "Kite flying will be a safe enjoyable sport for all ages when these simple, easy-to-follow rules are observed," Blanchard concluded.

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
