

AN EDITORIAL . . .

Voter Must Decide Hooded Market Bandit Issue for Himself

Thirty-two polling places will be open next Tuesday from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m., as the Torrance Unified School District asks additional financial support for the next three years.

The Torrance Press has made every effort to present both sides of the issue to the voters and to the taxpayers but the issue itself sometimes becomes cloudy with claims and counterclaims.

Taxpayers will be asked to decide whether or not to give the district an extra 50 cents over and above the present maximum of \$2.40 per \$100 assessed valuation.

MEDIAN BRACKET

School official and proponents of the measure have stumped the district pointing out that Torrance is now in a median bracket of the tax base compared with other communities of a compara-

Yet this, in itself, is not a reason for granting a tax override, and it must be noted that, with a 50-cent increase, Torrance district will be in the top 15 percent of the same group.

Opponents to the tax override claim a "No" vote is a vote of no confidence in the present administration.

There is little doubt that money is needed by the district if it is to expand its concept of education over the years. But the timing of this request could not be worse. The average homeowner and taxpayer has just been presented with his tax bills for city, county and school expenditures and is being gently nudged by the approaching April 15 deadline for state and federal income taxes.

HEAVY INDUSTRY

Yet this community is heavily industrialized, an advantage that the majority of the cities quoted do not have. Property taxes paid by these industries SHOULD make the tax burden to the Torrance homeowner somewhat lighter.

We admit that we do not know the answer. We feel that the issue has not been sufficiently clarified to give an opinion.

We know that there are two sides to any question. We know that proponents of the tax override are firmly convinced of the need for additional funds. But, on the other side of the ledger, there is the ever-patient taxpayer who keeps getting larger and larger tax bills with very little voice in the matter.

And there lies the crux of the entire issue. . . Apparently there is a need for the additional money. The question is, can the homeowners afford the additional expense at this time?
