
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

Torrance Chemist Announces Candidacy For Vacant Board of Education Position

A Torrance chemist this week threw his hat into the ring as he announced his candidacy for the local school board.

William J. Hanson, lab director for the Dow Chemical Company's plastic plant in Torrance filed this week as a candidate for one of the three seats that will be vacated in June.

A resident of California since 1922 he has resided with his wife and children at the family home, 327 Paseo de Gracia since 1955.

Hanson states that he is a candidate for the Torrance School Board because he belives that there are some serious weaknesses in the city's system which should and can be corrected without disrupting schools or increasing the costs of education.

Hanson is the father of three children who have spent a total of sixteen years in Torrance schools. He is a former school teacher with a general secondary teaching credential from UCLA. During the past several years he has displayed a continuing interest in schools as a PTA member and a TEAC represesenta-
