# **Arrested Cat Burglar Confesses Series of North Torrance Raids**



**Admits More Than 20 Forays** Which Netted Exactly \$316

Outstanding cooperation between Torrance and Gardena police officers this week nabbed a marauding cat burglar whose nightly forays had been terrorizing homeowners in both cities. Gardena police, Monday, arrested Jimmy L. Lybyer, 25, of 14914 S. Western Ave. when he was found hiding in a parked car on 180th

Lybyer answered a disscription circulated by Torrance officers of a suspect

in numerous cat burglaries in northern portions of the city. When questioned, he readily broke down and confessed to a housebreaking spree that lasted for more than three months and included more than 20 homes in Torrance and innumerable raids into homes in nearby cities. The 20 Torrance raids netted him exactly \$316, he ruefully admitted.

SIMPLE MO Chief of Police Percy

Bennett, commenting upon the capture, said, "His method of operation was simple. He would walk along the street, trying front doors. When he found one unlocked he would slip silently inside, go into the bedroom where the occupants were asleep and grab purses, wallets and other valuables. Once outside, he would clean out the wallets and throw them on the lawn.

Chief Bennett pointed out that both Lybyer and another suspected cat burglar, apprehended last month in Gardena, had started their forays in Torrance. Intensity of patrolling had driven both of the suspects out of the city, both admitted.


