Most Accidents Happen During Clear Weather

Despite the dangers posed by such driving hazards as rain, fog, darkness and adverse roadway conditions, upwards of two-thirds of all fatal and injury accidents in California last year occured during clear weather, on straight, level roads.

More than one-half of all injury accidents occured in daylight hours. This figure was reversed for fatal acci dents, with approximately two-thirds occuring at night. California Highway Patrol Commissioner Bradford M. Crittenden pointed out that the "figures support our often-expressed belief that drivers, not conditions, cause

most accidents. "Last year 3723 persons were killed and 154,760 were injured in highway accidents. Some of these deaths and injuries were attributable to poor visibility, road or weather conditions. Many, many more were attributed to driver error-lapses in aware-

ness or violations of the law. "Again I emphasize the necessity for mature drivingalertness, courtesy, and a realization that mistakes bring severe penalties, injury or death."
