
Incumbent Takes El Camino Board Race

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Lynn, Hanson, Charles Sweep Torrance School Board Ballot

VICTORY HANDSHAKE - Successful candidates for local school board posts posed Tuesday night after the final returns for both the Torrance Unified School District and the El Camino district were tallied. Election winners were Albert Charles.

Nine thousand and five Torrance voters hit the polls Tuesday to sweep out of office the three incumbent members of the school board and replace them with three of the 13 candidates who opposed them.
