

School Officials Report Transfer of Navy Site to District Nearly Complete

surplus Navy site to the Torrance Unified School District is nearly complete as the result of approval by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, according to Torrance School Board officials.

The land was sought to expand present Torrance High facilities. Torrance High currently is located on a 17-acre site, which school officials say prevents its expansion to accomodate more enrollments. North and South high schools are on 40-acre sites.
