## **One Line Reported** To Cost \$68 a Day **More Than Revenue**

Municipal bus services may be curtailed in Torrance following expected actions Tuesday night, it was revealed Friday.

First step in the expected cutback of transportation services in the community is the recommendation by Bus Superintendent M. A. Chamberlain that the council discontinue, as of June 16, the line presently providing services to the south-

western portion of the city. Line in question was established last September. It presently starts at 190th and Anza, travels through the Southwood tract to the Del Amo Shopping Center, post of city manager in Laalong Sepulveda, and ends in downtown Torrance.


