### Rangers Tell Plans For Summer Camp

#### Students Invited To Engineering Night at HJC

Stuart M. Friedman, chairman of the mathematics-physics division at Harbor College, today invited high school and college students to attend the annual Engineering Night, to be held on the local campus Tuesday, May 16, from 4 to 6 p.m. Engineering Night this year will be held in connection with the dedication-open house ceremonies for the new Harbor College Physics Building, which will be open for public inspection from 9:30 to 10:20 a.m., from 4 to 5 p.m., and from 7:30 to 8:15 p.m.

The focus of attention of the 2-hour Engineering Night program will be an address at 5 p.m. in the college gymnasium by Dr. William E. Ballhaus, vice president and general manager of Nortronics, a division of Northrop Corporation. Dr. Ballhaus' subject will be "Guidance Technology in Earth and Space Craft."

The afternoon's activities will also include a refreshment and get-acquainted period, observation of exhibits and displays, guided tours of the new facilities, and informal question and answer group meetings.

"We are eager to have students attend Engineering Night," Friedman said. "We think it will help them clarify their thinking about the nature of engineering work and encourage them to give high priority to mathematics and science courses in planning present and future educational programs."

Friedman is being assisted in preparation for Engineering Night by Robert F. Gervais, Harbor College engineering instructor, together with other members of the mathematics division.

With Southland schools scheduled to close on June 16, Woodcraft Ranger camps are being readied for the summer season. It has been announced by officials of the Community Chest-sponsored youth organization.

More than 2,000 boys and girls will attend Ranger camps during the nine week season beginning June 26, according to James C. Flanders, Executive Director.

Leslie E. Osborne, Jr., will direct the Stanley Ranch camp. This 240 acre ranch camp in the Newhall-Saugus area features horseback riding and other ranch experiences. Osborne is a veteran member of the Ranger camp staff, having served as counselor and Program Director before being promoted to his present post as Camp Director.

#### Rabbi Front Has Part in Sabuoth Services May 21

Rabbi Henri Front of Temple Menorah in Redondo Beach, 112 N. Catalina, will be among spiritual leaders in synagogues and temples throughout the Southland who will use the Fifth Commandment—Honor Thy Father and Thy Mother—as the basis for sermons at Shabuoth services Sunday morning, May 21.

Shabuoth is the two-day Jewish holiday (beginning at sundown May 20) which traditionally marks the giving of the Ten Commandments to Moses.

Rabbis of all groups—Orthodox, Conservative and Reform—are cooperating with the Los Angeles Jewish Home for the Aged at 325 S. Boyle Ave. in spotlighting the problems of senior citizens for their congregants during Shabuoth.

The joint venture was arranged by Rabbi Israel Chodos of Sinai Temple in Beverly Hills, as chairman of the Home's rabbinical advisory board, and Sol Levine, the Home's past president who is now chairman of its religious committee.

Founded in 1912, the Home is now celebrating its "golden year" of service to the community's aged as the largest of its kind outside of New York City. Most of the participating rabbis had previously toured its five-acre grounds to meet the 310 residents and learn first-hand of the multiple services offered senior adults.
