Jurco, chairman of the project, urged parents to protect children and themselves against paralytic polio before tht high incidence season in late summer and early fall.

Last year children under ten years of age accounted for 60 per cent of all paralytic polio cases in Los Angeles County, it was pointed out. Three properly spaced shots are needed for complete protection, with annual booster shots recommended.
