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Rezoning May Save Future of Torrance

Planners Need Long View Toward Future

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Attempts to rezone 150 acres of industrial land for use, a move that would pave the way for a new housing development on the Marble Estate near the intersection of Crenshaw and Sepulveda, has met with outspoken criticism of the measure.

Equally outspoken approval of the plan has been voiced by builders and businessmen who feel that the population boom in Torrance should not be slowed down in favor of a rose-tinted dream behind some distant horizon.

As it stands, the delicate balance between planned economic growth and visionary hopes of a star-studded future for Torrance could be upended by nearsighted thinking on the part of top level planners and city officials.

Four years ago large expanses of industrially zoned land were available for development in Torrance.

Through the years overtures by builders and investors have been okayed by city planners and much of this property has now been converted to commercial use.

Shopping centers erected during the period, including two huge discount houses on Western Ave., have removed the greater portion of this M-2 land from the "available" list.

NOT M-2 USE

It should be pointed out that very little of this land was actually used for industrial purposes. A tremendous - portion of this industrial land "bank" is presently being used for strictly commercial purposes

Owners of the 1072 acres of M-2 land left in the city have pointed out that there has been no evidence of an industrial "movement" toward Torrance nor is any such movement expected in the future.

They are left in the unenviable position of owning land that they cannot use but upon which they must pay taxes. Efforts to convert this land to residential areas have aroused the antagonism of planners who feel that the land must be kept open for future development.

PINCH

The very commercial interests that have mushroomed on the previously available M-2 land have felt the economic pinch caused by the thinking that encourages businesses to develop but curtails a second development that would bring customers to them.

The opportunity to develop this land into homes for new residents in the community, solid families that would lend stability to a sagging economy, should not be passed by.
