Torrance residents will pause Tuesday to pay homage to our nation's dead and to quietly observe the sacrifices of those-who fell that this country would continue strong and proud.

Many churches in Torrance have scheduled special observances while graveside services will be held in most of the area's cemeteries.

Known originally as Decoration Day, the observance began in 1869 when General John A. Logan, commander in chief of the Grand Army of the Republic issued an order designating the day as one in which the graves of soldiers would be decorated.

The holiday was originally devoted to honoring the memory of those who fell in the Civil War, but is now also dedicated to the memory of the dead of all wars. Whatever its purpose or its origins it will be a day

of sorrow to the living left behind. . . .
