Thousands of Youths, **On Vacati on, Will** Soon Be Seeking Jobs

Over one thousand Torrance teenagers graduated from high school last weekend and thousands more of the local youngsters, still attending school, began an extended 21/2 month vacation.

Still thousands more returned to Torrance from the colleges and prep schools they are attending.

A tremendous majority of these youngsters, as soon as they relax a bit from the grind of end-of-term exams, will be hunting for summer jobs.

With the employment picture in the Torrance area perking up for the first time in months some jobs will be available for these youngsters, many of whom are earning money to carry them through the next semester of school

Yet, literally thousands will be unable to find employment and will spend the summer fruitlessly searching.

POLICE PROBLEM

Much of the difficulty encountered by police and law enforcement agencies during the summer months is caused by youngsters seeking jobs . . . and unable to find them; youngsters with too much time on their hands.
